

Raiders roll to victories on court, diamond

It was a banner Thursday for several Raider sides as the softball, baseball and tennis teams all emerged victorious. Fulton scored its biggest win of the softball season by blanking defending Class B champion Homer 3-0 while the baseball Raiders put together their best inning of the season to charge past Homer 11-4. Completing a big day for teams in red was the tennis team, 5-2 winners in Chittenango.

Girls blank defending champs

RBI triples from Lindsay Larkin and Hather Reed helped fuel the Raider rise to 9-5 in softball as Fulton handed Homer just its third loss in 16 starts. The Raiders scored once in the fourth inning and added two more in the fifth while collecting their second shutout in the past three games.

Pitcher Jessica Palmitesso held the Trojans to just two hits, aided by strong defensive play from shortstop Jackie LoCastro. Palmitesso notched eight strikeouts and added an RBI for the winners, who will take part in the Phoenix Tournament on Sunday. In the past three games the senior hurler has yielded just one run for the Raiders, who have improved to 8-4 in league play and 9-5 overall.

Big day for Raider baseball

The Raider baseball team finally put it all together on Thursday to notch its second win of the season at the expense of an 8-8 Homer side. Eight big runs in the top of the sixth inning put the game away for Fulton after the guests had scored two in the top of the first and one more in the fifth to take a 3-1 lead.

Kody Ravesi picked up the win on the hill for Fulton and was backed by an offensive attack that featured 13 singles as well as four Trojan miscues. Bobby Bonnie led the way with three RBI and Dan Bolster added two while Ravesi, Hunter Gorton, Derek Southworth, Josh Collins, Tyler Terramiggi and Max Ambuske each drove in a run.

Tennis overpowers Bears

The Raider tennis team improved to 6-5 on the season by bursting past Chittenango 5-2 on Thursday. Fulton swept through the four singles matches with relative ease as the top three players held the Bears to just four points along the way.

Derek Bateman scored a 6-0, 6-0 win at first

singles and Eric Naioti followed with a 6-1, 6-0 triumph in the second singles pairing. Adam Wolford battled to a 6-4 first set win at third singles before closing at 6-0, and fourth singles player Richard Reeschke outlasted his opponent 7-6 in the first set and then won 6-1

to give the Raiders a commanding lead.

In doubles competition Nate Borden and Kyler Gardner combined on a 6-3, 7-6 victory in the first position. Fulton's second and third doubles teams also played well, but came up just short in three set finals.

All eyes are on Boston in playoff battles

In the Stanley Cup playoffs, the Boston Bruins have done something historic in the last week. The Bruins, who were up 3-0 in their series, had it all but won, but somehow in the last week Boston managed to give that all up and are staring into the eyes of something historic. Yes, the Philadelphia Flyers tied it all up 3-3 and are heading into game seven with all the momentum. Ironic isn't it?

Let's flash back to October of 2004, the MLB American League Pennant; the Boston Red Sox found themselves in a 3-0 deficit, and came back to win the series, which was the first time a baseball team had ever responded to such a deficit to actually win the series. Senior Bobby Earnshaw led the Raiders in scoring with three goals, and one assist while sophomore Steven DeLisle recorded two goals. Senior Jack Howard scored one goal, along with junior Brett Williams who also scored one goal, but added four assists. Junior Colin Shannon had one assist on the day. Senior goalie Eric Belair recorded 20 saves in the game.

The seniors gave it their all throughout the game, as well as the whole team. The seniors: Eric Belair, Bobby Earnshaw, Cody Hogan, Jack Howard and Jake Tallents will be missed for their leadership and experience.

Fulton's loss drops their record to 2-13 on the season, but the team will have a chance to get one more win. The Raiders have their final game on Monday in Whitesboro, where Fulton will try to avenge an earlier season loss to the Warriors.

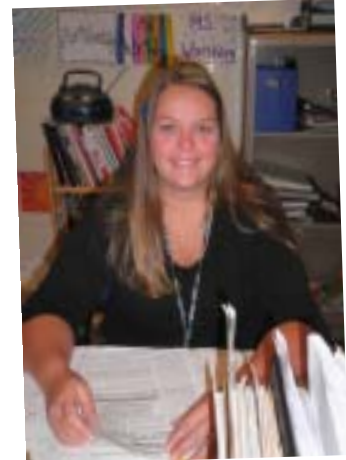
