

Raiders charge into Class A volleyball final

A little less than a month ago the varsity volleyball team was struggling to put together a winning season.

My how times have changed.

And on Wednesday night Coach Richardson's charges moved to within one victory of a rags to riches story by upending #3-seeded Oneida 3-1 to advance to this Saturday's Class A championship match. Improving their record to 12-7 on the season, the #7-seed Raiders scored a repeat of last year's Class A final while claim-

ing their third straight win in sectional play. With #2 Watertown and #3 Oneida both vanquished, Fulton has its eyes set firmly on top seed and 18-1 Homer, a 3-1 winner over Whitesboro in Wednesday's other Class A semi-final as the Raiders go gunning for their third consecutive Section 3 crown.

Fulton opened with wins of 25-22 and 25-17 before Oneida rallied to take a 25-19 decision in the third game. But rather than fold, the Raiders responded with an overpowering

25-12 victory to book their sixth straight trip to the Class A final.

It was another combined team effort as Kirsten Francis and Erika Johnson knocked down seven kills apiece and Francis added 10 digs to go with six kills from Elyse Cianfarano and 18 assists by Kali Kearns. Kassie McCann had three aces and eight digs for the Raiders to offset nine aces from Oneida's Candra Connelly and nine kills with 27 assists from Paige Pendleton for the 13-3 Indians.

Mock Trial team set to defend county crown

Although the scrimmage was a learning experience, the GRB Mock Trial team came out on top against Sandy Creek. Students had to miss classes in order to prepare for the event, and their hard work paid off.

Students were given a case based on a real trial that has already been tried. The students are then split up into defense and plaintiff attorneys and witnesses, and have to learn the case. The teams then meet in competition, each team bringing either defense or plaintiff to the event. The attorneys would then ask the witnesses who, what, when, where and why questions in an attempt to pull the judge to their side. The judge will make their decision, and will announce the winner.

Students are given points based on how well they know the case, objections made, how professionally they conduct themselves in the courtroom, and overall respectfulness. There are time restrictions for how long an attorney can question each witness, and they begin to lose points if they go over it.

The GRB Mock Trial team has been working hard since the beginning of January to learn the information, but when the big day finally came, chaos ensued. They went to the library for some last minute preparation, only to discover that two of their team members could not attend the competition. Other team members, Logan Carvey and Christine Proud stepped up to the plate. Carvey, a freshman,

the baby of the team, became one of the plaintiff attorneys, and had to learn the case and come up with strategy in less than four hours. Proud, a two-year member of the team, had to learn the ins and outs of the information of witness Chris Crangle in the same amount of time.

Despite the difficulties, the Mock Trial team managed to pull a win out of the scrimmage, as well as some valuable advice for future competitions.

Last year, the GRB Mock Trial team was the county champs, winning \$250 upon graduation, and advancing all the way to the regional competitions later in the year. Sadly, the team left regionals without being able to grab a win. This year, though, the team plans to advance to regionals again, and, with hard work and a little luck, be able to take home a win.
