



Laxmen fall in season finale

The Raider boys lacrosse season ended last night with a 14-8 loss to Cortland, although the game was much closer than the score might have indicated. The first quarter ended with the Raiders up by a score of 3-2, but the powerhouse of Cortland, who finished the regular season with a record of 12-4, could only be stalled before the engine started. Cortland put in six goals to Fulton's two in the second quarter, with the score at halftime standing 8-5 in favor of the Tigers.

The third quarter continued to go in favor of Cortland, as the Tigers put in five goals, outscoring Fulton by four in the frame and jumping to a lead of 13-6. The fourth quarter favored the Raiders, but not enough to make a serious impact on the game, as Fulton outscored Cortland by a score of 2-1 in the final quarter, resulting in the final score of 14-8.

Leading the Raider offense was senior captain Brett Williams, and junior Bryan Benton. Williams had the hat trick, recording three goals and an assist, while Benton had four goals of his own. Senior captain Corey Crook also put a goal in the books. Junior netminder Colin Blake had 13 saves on the evening as Fulton finished the season at 3-13.

Colby Reagan (3-3) and Austin Dilorio (3-2) paced the winners, who also picked up big efforts from Phil Potter (2-3), TJ Beardsley (2-2), and Chad Timmons (201) while Casey Bergeron registered 17 saves.

The end of the season match-up proved to be a hard battle and a well-fought contest as the Raiders did not give up until the final horn to cap their season with pride and determination.

Plan now for driver education class

On Friday May 13, the forms for summer driver education became available in the Guidance office. Students must turn 16 on or before July first to be eligible for this course. Registrations must be handed in by Thursday, May 26 in order to be considered for driver education. There are forty-eight openings for the summer course, so interested students should get their paperwork in to the guidance office as soon as possible.

However, even if students hand in their paperwork on time, there is no promising that they will make it into the course. The 48 openings will be filled with 2011-2012 seniors first, then leftover spots will be filled according to date of birth. A previous license or permit is not required for this course, but students who do not have one are required to have a copy of their birth certificate in order to prove their age. The cost of the class is \$100.

Driver education is not required for new drivers; however it is a good idea. The class will provide students with experience and teach them the rules of the road. If students do not get into driver education over the summer, there are also classes offered in the fall and spring. Learning to drive is a huge milestone in a person's life, and driver education is one way to reach this goal.

Spending an evening in the veterinary world

A friend of mine and my mom's volunteers as a veterinary assistant at the Oswego County Humane Society, and last Tuesday night, she let me tag along. Some things were just like I expected, and others weren't. When I was there, the only thing that happened was sterilizing cats, but it still gave me a lot to think about.

One of the biggest things that I remember was that the vet had to spay a number of cats that were pregnant. She admitted that at first, she wasn't thrilled about having to go through with something like that; it provided some ethical issues at first. But later on, she would see cats that were brought to her because of neglect and abuse, and decided that it would be better to not be born than to be born into something like that. And, she said cats were pretty overpopulated, and could repopulate like crazy, so sometimes it was just something she needed to do.

I also learned that just because some things make you squeamish, that doesn't mean you can't be a vet. There were three women I was able to observe that night, and all three of them had something that really set them off. For the vet and the lady I went with, it was parasites, and especially maggots that just grossed them out. The other woman said her worst experiences were usually when an animal came in with a very broken bone, especially if it was grinding and making noises. So just because something makes you squeamish, don't immediately stop considering veterinarian work. As long as you can still keep your head and control your actions, you should be fine.

The veterinarian that I was there with had some advice for those thinking of becoming a vet. "One important thing to remember," she said, "is that there are more veterinarian schools than just Cornell." She said she loved going to Cornell, but advised applying to others also, because some of them are cheaper, and some just have a different feel than Cornell.

Another piece of advice she gave was to find a vet to volunteer with, get a summer job with, or just shadow for the day. "Most vets don't mind volunteers or observers for a while they work," she said. She also said being close to a vet working, and hopefully being able to watch, can do two things for you. One, it will let you know if this is really a field of work you want to go into. You might find that when you actu-

ally watch a surgery performed on an animal, that this isn't something you want to do. Also, it can give you experience, so when you get out of college and go to apply for a job, employers can see that this is work you've experienced outside of just schooling.

Being a veterinarian is a great consideration for anyone looking to work with animals, but there is still a lot to consider to make sure it is the right choice for you. Try finding a local veterinarian that you can watch for a day, or even a few hours, just to see if it is something you would really want to stick with.
