Key stretch starts tonight for Raider laxmen

The Raider boys lacrosse team will be hoping to renew their quest for a playoff berth today by hosting the Spartans of New Hartford. The game is set for a 5 p.m. faceoff and will surely be a close one with both games last year resulting in losses for Fulton, but only by a combined three goals.

New Hartford has shown much promise in the league compared to a year ago by starting 2-1 with all of their contests being against OHSL Freedom League opponents. Their two wins have come against Chittenango and Cortland with their lone loss to ES-M. One could say that the New Hartford Spartans are just warming up, however, as they have been on a two-game win streak since their home loss to those "other" Spartans from the outer banks of Syracuse.

Leading the way for New Hartford on the offensive end has been Nick Levanti, an attackman who uses his size to power by his defenders. Levanti has tallied 16 points through three games, with 11 of them coming from goals. Sophomore defender Mark Pollock will be called upon to deny Levanti any good shots on the goal. Nick Suits has tallied 7 goals and 1 assist so far and is a quick midfielder with capable dodging ability from up top. Senior long pole midfielder Ryan Knopp is projected to handle the matchup.

The Raiders have had a tough start to the

Documentary, Bully, should be viewed by all

Bully is a documentary about the true torture that kids endure daily at schools across the country. What could be better than that; a true eye opening film.

But students will not be able to see it because of a film rating handed down by the Motion Picture Association (MPAA), the film was rated R because of the language and violence depicted in the movie. Such a rating means that people under 17 need to be accompanied by an adult, prohibiting those who the movie is aimed at from seeing it. These kids LIVE in an R-rated world; they experience the torture and they hear the F-bomb flung at them in the worst of malice.

The documentary has been released unrated to allow movie theaters to decide at their own discretion who to allow to see the film. This decision by production company Weinstein Co. is controver-

Advance prep underway for turkey season

The month of April is a busy month for all kinds of Outdoorsmen. Anglers, Hunters, and people who simply enjoy being outside have plenty of things to do, and April is the perfect time to do them.

Of course anglers have trout season and the warm weather brings hikers and ATVs outside, but what is there for hunters to do in April?

Sunday, April 15 marks the end of Snow Goose Season in Central New York, but even though the season is still open, there are fewer and fewer geese remaining in the area. Now that the geese have moved north, there is nothing to hunt other than the unprotected species like woodchucks and pigeons, and not all hunters enjoy going after these animals.

However, after Snow Goose Season, hunters do not have long to



wait before the second most popular New York hunting season opens: Spring Turkey.

In New York, the month of May coincides with Spring Turkey Season. In the weeks before Turkey Season actually starts, it is the perfect time for hunters to scout out the elusive birds and to set up their hunting blinds. Whereas deer are often hunted from tree stands, Turkeys are usually hunted from ground level. This means that many hunters chose to use blinds in order to hide them from their prey. Blinds should be set up well before the season starts to make sure that the animals are used to them. A blind that the animals realize is there is an ineffective one.

While April may not have too many of its own special hunting seasons, that does not mean that you cannot do something to help out your chances of getting a turkey. While the birds cannot legally be taken until May, take the time to get ready in the weeks beforehand. A few hours of preparation now can lead to a lot of success during the actual season.

Putting in 5 goals on the year has been fellow attackmen Bryan Benton who has 5 points, all on goals. Rounding out the attack is classmate Joe Sutton who has 3 goals and 1 assist. Midfielder Tyler Lockwood has accepted an increased scoring role at the midfield, popping in 2 scores so far in the 2012 campaign.
