Meetings could facilitate better understanding

Be on the lookout! Ticks infecting CNY

During the warm months, most people are concerned about mosquito-borne diseases. But that's not the case this year. With the early warm weather, experts are predicting a drastic increase in the tick population. Ticks are usually round shaped, expanding approximately to the size of a pencil eraser when filled with a blood meal. Their size is infinitely small to the human eye.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, most cases of tick bites are from nymph bites. Nymphs are undeveloped ticks, ranging from 2mm-4mm in size. Ticks are usually black, but vary from brown to red also. Ticks generally reside in a moist area such as the forest floor, tall grass or shrubs, and mulched-areas.

Ticks are the leading transporter of disease in the United States. They carry toxins that can be transmitted through a simple bite. The well-known tick-borne illness is Lyme disease. Mammals are the primary victims of ticks, especially humans and domestic pets. They attach to the skin and nourish on the mammal blood for many days.

If the tick has been embedded in a person's skin for 36 hours, then they have a risk of Lyme disease. The symptoms of this disease range from muscle aches and headaches to serious long-term damage to the brain, heart, muscles, and nerves.

To decrease the risk of Lyme disease, a person should avoid tick-infested areas or use a repellent with DEET on their skin or clothing. Also, nymphs infest the forest floor, so people are encouraged to examine their shoes and socks carefully. For those who come into contact with a wooded area or live in a moist environment, daily tick checks are advised for you and your pets.

During your cautious examination, be sure to check behind the ears, inside the belly button, and in your hair. Another precaution is to dry your clothes in the dryer on high heat to eliminate the chance of spreading ticks in your house. Remember these tiny arachnids can change your life forever in the span of just 36 hours.

Supper's on! It's spaghetti and garlic bread

How about a little pasta? This wonderful dinner meal is certain

to bring the whole family to the table!

Spaghetti Italian: This is appetizing pasta that is full of energy and flavor! Pasta is good for anyone who plays sports or anyone who is usually active.

Ingredients:

1/2 pound Italian sausage
4 (6.5 ounce) cans tomato sauce
1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tomatoes
2 bay leaves
1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1 teaspoon dried basil
1 teaspoon dried oregano
Salt and pepper to taste
1 package spaghetti



Directions: In a large skillet, brown sausage over medium heat; drain and set aside. In a large saucepan over medium heat, combine tomato sauce, diced tomatoes, bay leaves, Italian seasoning, garlic powder, basil, oregano, salt, pepper and Italian sausage; mix well.

Simmer over medium-low heat for at least one hour; it is best if simmered all day. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; drain. Mix sauce with hot pasta; serve.

Cheesy Garlic Bread: This will go perfectly with any pasta dish, or as a little snack. It tastes great and the family will be begging for more!

Ingredients:

1 loaf Italian bread
5 tablespoons butter, softened
2 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil
3 cloves garlic, crushed
1 teaspoon dried oregano
Salt and pepper to taste
1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese



Directions: Preheat the broiler. Cut the bread into slices 1 to 2 inches thick. In a small bowl, mix butter, olive oil, garlic, oregano, salt and pepper. Spread the mixture evenly on the bread slices. On a medium baking sheet, arrange the slices evenly and broil 5 minutes, or until slightly brown. Check frequently so they do not burn. Remove from broiler. Top with cheese and return to broiler 2 to 3 minutes, until cheese is slightly brown and melted. Serve at once.

Boys outlast Redhawks for second straight win

The ball keeps rolling for the Raider boys lacrosse team as they defeated the Central Square Red Hawks in another one goal thriller, prevailing 5-4 on Thursday. For the second time in three days the Raiders found themselves in another back and forth battle, and as was the case during Tuesday's 7-6 win over New Hartford, Fulton emerged victorious by the slimmest of counts.

Sophomore Carson Vono opened the scoring by hitting the five-hole on a well-placed shot from about 10 yards out in the first quarter. The quarter ended 2-0 when Central Square failed to score. The Raider defense went on to shut down the Red Hawks offense in the first quarter, holding them to zero goals to give the Raiders a 2-0 lead going into the 2nd quarter. The second goal came in the last seconds available when senior captain Ross Maxam found a cutting co-captain Joe Sutton across the entire length of the box to go up two goals with 1.1 seconds left.

The second quarter was much of the same but this time the Red Hawks answered every score the Raiders could deliver. Maxam hit a cutting Sutton twice more to increase their total to four and the Red Hawks scored two transition goals to make it a 4-2 game going into the break.

The third quarter was all Central Square when they scored two unanswered goals and tied it up going into the final stanza. Right out of the break, senior faceoff specialist Tyler Lockwood won the draw clean to fellow midfielder Steven DeLisle who carried it down and hit Maxam, who dodged from behind and put the Raiders up 5-4 on a wrap-around shot.

This proved to be enough scoring to pull out the win, but the defense was surely tested. Fulton was forced to play a man down for about three minutes in a row from 4:55 to 1:55, so the man down unit had to hold on. They did so and the offense regained control with about two minutes left where a group of seniors controlled the ball until time ran out and the horn sounded.

Leading point getters were Joe Sutton, who had 3 points on 3 goals, his second straight game with a hat trick, and Ross Maxam who tallied 3 points on one goal and 2 assists, continuing his streak of games with at least 3 points which now sits at 5. Also rippling

the net for the Fulton cause was Carson Vono in his first game back from a spring break trip. The defense played well and has allowed an average of 5 goals over its past two games. Senior goalkeeper Colin Blake had perhaps the best game of his career, stopping 11 shots on his way to a .733 save percentage.
