

Record-setting seasons for Raider lacrosse

The 2012 spring sports season featured two of the most successful squads in their respective sports and one of the most successful spring sports teams in school history. Both the boys and girls lacrosse teams amassed records that either tied the best win percentage in school history or set the record.

The Lady Raider lacrosse team featured a 15-4 record that included two playoff wins. The team defeated Jamesville-Dewitt in the quarterfinals 18-6; their third win over the Rams on the season, and went on to beat the Watertown Cyclones 12-11 to advance to the Finals. There they met a very good Oswego team who they fell to 13-7.

The Lady Raiders finals trip was the first for any spring sport in over 25 years and their 15 wins ousted the school record by far. Leading the offense on their dream season were junior attackmen Erica Knaub and Kate Rothrock. Knaub totaled 83 points on 61 goals and 22 assists while Rothrock tallied 53 scores and 22 assists.

The midfield production came mainly from two sophomores in Amelia Coakley and Julia Ludington, with Coakley scoring 47 times and assisting on nine occasions for 56 points, and Ludington scoring 27 times for a 37 point total. Seniors Jordan Rizzo (26g, 4a) and Andrea Gould (7g, 10a) offered different scoring options throughout the year. Casey Shannon (5g, 3a), Alise Tallents (7g, 1a), Alanah McClellan (5g, 1a), Erika Johnson (2g), and Emma Whitmore (1g) also contributed. Senior Torrie Whelsky recorded a .590 save percentage on the season.

The boys lost in the quarterfinals to the Carthage Comets 13-7 in their first playoff appearance since 2009 and their fourth since 1992. A 7-9 regular season record vaulted them into the Section 3 tournament and the Raiders put up a fight but could not convert.

Leading the offensive train for the Red Raiders was senior attackman and Captain Ross Maxam. Maxam totaled 72 points on 24 goals and 48 assists on the season. His

48 assists broke the school record and led all of Section 3 in the category. The 72 point total is believed to be a single season school record yield among the boys as well.

Co-Captain, fellow classmate, and fellow attackman, Joe Sutton led the team in goals with 30 and assisted on 16 occasions for a total of 46 points in his senior season. Seth DeLisle tied for third on the team in goals with 14. He also added 4 assists for a total of 18 points in his first varsity campaign as

When it comes to pests, there is no season

Once turkey season ends in the spring, most hunters trade their guns for their fishing poles and head out to the lake. With no major hunting seasons during the summer, most sportsmen and women try for bass and walleye instead of pursuing the few animals that are unprotected.

Just because there are no popular hunting seasons open in June, July, or August does not mean that there is nothing for avid hunters to go after, there are some species that are not protected and can be hunted year round.

Non-protected game are usually common pests and sometimes nonnative species. These species can be taken in any number, at any time of day, year round. Their year round "seasons" give hunters the opportunity to keep in practice between the major big game seasons. Not many of these species are eaten or otherwise used by



the hunters who pursue them. While this fact may not sit well with some people, it must be taken into account that these animals are usually pests, and hunting is one of the most humane ways of dealing with them.

Starlings, parakeets, and some sparrows are not protected, but not many people go after these species. Their small size allows them to go unnoticed and most people simply ignore them. The most popular non-protected game are woodchucks, red squirrels, and pigeons. It may be hard to believe, but there are people who chose to exclusively hunt these species. The three most popular non-protected species each provide unique experiences for hunters. Fast paced pigeon hunting, long range woodchuck shooting, and red squirrel stalking can help a hunter practice methods that can be used during deer or turkey season.

While at first glance there may be much for hunters to do in the summer months, there is usually a farmer or two who would not object to having someone try and rid their fields of a few woodchucks. If hunters look in the right places, there is always something to do.

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Capturing final jewel of Triple Crown isn't easy

Horse racing has been around since the 1800s. But throughout the years there have only been a few horses that have been good enough to win the prestige Triple Crown. There have been many who have come very close to making it to the finish line in first place but have been beaten by a horse that comes up from behind and wins by a few lengths. Some of those horses include Funny Cide, Smarty Jones, Big Brown, War Emblem and Real Quiet.

On Saturday afternoon I'll Have Another will try to avoid joining this list, and instead looks to become the first Triple Crown winner since Affirmed in 1978, a stretch of 34 years without a victor on United States horse racing's grandest stage.

The first horse that won the first two races of the Triple Crown was Burgoo King in 1932, but in the Belmont Stakes he lost to Faireno. Burgoo King was not able to run in the third race due to a lack of paperwork from the handlers and also because of a twisted ankle.

Four years later the same thing happened to Bold Venture, who lost to Granville in 1936, and again in 1944 when Pensive lost the Belmont to Bounding Home. Bold Venture went into the Kentucky Derby without winning a single stakes race and his jockey was an apprentice jockey who had only been racing horses for less than a year.

There was a lapse of 14 years for horses who almost made it to the winner's circle at the end of the Belmont, but in 1958 Tim Tam was good enough to win the first two legs of the race but lost the third leg of the race to Cavan. On the final few yards of the Belmont Tim Tam fractured a sesamoid bone in his leg and hobbled across the finish line. The injury ended his career but did not impair his siring career. Also the band Tim Tam and the Turn Ons got part of their name from Tim Tam.

Then yet again three years later the same thing happened to Carry Back when he lost

to Sherlock in 1961. Carry Back had a very unusual pedigree. His mother, Joppy, was banned from racing for her endless refusals to leave the start gate. She was then bred to an obscure stallion named Saggy. After a period of being held as a stud he was thrown back into racing in 1963 and then returned back to being a stud at the end of 1963.

In 1964 the great Northern Dancer came in first in both the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness Stakes, beating the undefeated Hill Rise, but came in third to Quadrangle and Roman Brother. Then again in 1966 Kauai King came in fourth to Amberoid, and in 1968 Forward Pass came in second to Stage Door Johnny by one and a half lengths

but was later declared the winner by disqualification making him the only horse that has ever happened to.

In 1969 Majestic Prince was the first to enter the Belmont Stakes undefeated, but came in second to Arts and Letters by five and a half lengths. Majestic Prince was retired at the age of 4 and continued his life of retirement at Spendthrift Farm in Lexington, Kentucky and he sired 33 winners including his son Coastal, who won the

Belmont Stakes against Spectacular Bid.

In 1971 Canonero II was the first Venezuelan thoroughbred race horse that I have ever heard about. Canonero II was born in 1968 and had a noticeable crooked front leg which brought the assumption that he wouldn't be able to race ever. When Canonero II arrived in Louisville, Kentucky he was dismissed as a horse who didn't belong in that kind of elite competition and he was then listed at the bottom of the "herd".

But what they all didn't know was Canonero II was capable of winning the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness, but he lost the Belmont to a horse named Pass Catcher due to an infection in his hoof that led him to crossing the finish line in fourth place with difficulty. He retired and stood as a stud in 1972 until he died in 1981.

Spectacular Bid was the winner of the first two legs of the Triple Crown but on the day of the Belmont he had a freak incident and stepped on a safety pin that became embedded in his foot. But after the handlers found out about his accident he was still sound and entered into the race, where he placed fourth against Coastal and Golden Act, both of which he had beaten before, but he was run too hard and too long early in the race. He then took two months off for recovery and then got back into racing after he was fully recovered.

Pleasant Colony was a big and gangly colt that in three years time became the winner of the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness but yet again did not win the Belmont. As is often the case with most horses that haven't won the Belmont they had injuries, but that was not the case with Pleasant Colony as he just fell short and came in third to Summing.

Alysheba was sired by the great Alydar and was sold as a yearling for a striking \$500,000. During the Kentucky Derby Alysheba and his jockey were almost knocked to the ground by a collision with Bet Twice and his jockey. He regained his

lead after the collision and still won the Derby. He later made a comeback with a win in the Preakness. At the time of the Belmont Alysheba was racing without the use of the drug Lasix, which was illegal in New York State at the time. (Lasix is now called Furosemide and is used during the treatment of congestive heart failure and edema). Without that drug Alysheba lost to Bet Twice, but later stood at stud and produced many great stakes winners.

Sunday Silence was the next horse to win both the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness in 1989. Sunday Silence lost to Easy Goer by eight lengths. After standing at stud for a while in the United States he was ignored by American breeders and was later sold to a Japanese breeder and stood at Shadai Stallion Station.

In 1997 Silver Charm was another one to add to the drought for a Triple Crown Winner. He was best known for winning the first two legs of the race for the Triple Crown, but he placed second in the Belmont Stakes to Touch Gold.

This time the same thing happened a year later when Real Quiet lost the Belmont by a nose to Victory Gallop during the final stride of the race. As a four year old Real Quiet suffered from a fractured splint bone but still managed to produce some stakes winners mainly in other countries. Real Quiet died after falling in his pasture on September 27, 2010.

Charismatic was the next horse to add to the stretch of not having a Triple Crown winner. Charismatic stud made him the third generation of the bloodlines started by Secretariat and Northern Dancer. Charismatic kept the lead throughout the Belmont Stakes until they got to the final stretch and he ended up coming in third to Lemon Drop Kid and Vision and Verse. In 2002 Charismatic was shipped off to Japan to stand as a stud for \$500,000 which is about \$5,000 for the live cover.

The next horse to win the first two legs of the Triple Crown was War Emblem in 2002. War Emblem tripped and almost fell to his knees when he came out of the gate, leaving him in the dust of all the other horses. Amazingly he still made it back to the lead, but fell short of the lead around the final turn of the race and finished behind the winner

Sarava. He was later sold to the Yoshida racing family for \$17.7 million to stand stud at Shadai Stallion Station.

The next horse to fall just short of racing immortality was Funny Cide in 2003 a local New York State horse. Funny Cide was not the typical race horse as he was not a stallion, he was a gelding (not able to reproduce). Unlike every other horse's racing career he raced until he was about 7 years old instead of ending his career as a 4 year old. But it was claimed that Funny Cide had not liked the track that the Belmont is held on and he finished behind Empire Maker. At the age of 4 he was having problems due to respiratory issues.

Then again in 2004 Smarty Jones won the first two legs of the Triple Crown and lost the Belmont to Birdstone. He ended his ca-

reer in August of 2004 due to the bruising of his ankles. He finished with 8 wins to his career.

And finally in 2008 Big Brown was the last known horse to win the first two legs of the Triple Crown when Big Brown lost to Da'Tara. He was injured with a quarter crack that was stitched together with stainless steel sutures and he was still able to race. But then crossed the finish line after winner Da'Tara.

Does I'll Have Another have another big win ahead on Saturday? That's what racing enthusiasts will be watching to find out. If that does happen, the horse will become just the 12th horse all time to win racing's Triple Crown, and the longest drought in Triple Crown history will finally come to an end at 34 years.


