## How to find success in the job hunt

Dear Myrtle:

With summer right around the corner, my parents are starting to put pressure on me about getting a summer job. I have applied at a few different places but none of them have called me back. I want to know if you can give me any tips to make an employer want to hire me.

I was also wondering if you could give me advice about interviews in case one of the places that I have applied to calls me back. Thank you,  
“Jobless and clueless”

Dear “Jobless and clueless:”

I would like to start by saying that I have been in that exact same situation before. Luckily for you, I know some tips that you may find beneficial to your current situation.

For starters, when going in for an application, make sure that you are prepared. If you plan to fill out the application while you're there, make sure that you bring all information that you will need to fill it out (ex: reference information, social security card/number, school information, etc.). When filling out your application, make sure that it is neat and legible. You should try to write in your best possible handwriting and if you do end up making a mistake on the paper, instead of crossing it out, you should get a new one and start all over.

The next tip I have is to always follow up on your application. Employers are looking for potential employees who are persistent and interested in getting that particular job. You should follow up within a few days after you hand in your application. You do so by either calling or going into the store and talking to the manager.

If you decide to call, be sure to ask for a manager. Once you are put through to the manager, start by saying “Hello. My name is \_\_\_\_\_, and I am calling to follow up on an application that I put in recently.” Then follow the conversation wherever it goes from there. If you decide to call, pick a time when you think the store won't be busy. Normally if the place is busy, the manager will rush to get off the phone. If you call while the store isn't as busy, this gives the manager a better opportunity to talk about your application with you. If you are planning to follow up by going into the store, I would suggest you use the same tips, but apply them to an in person inter-

action. I would suggest you follow up on your application almost every day. This shows your commitment to this job.

If you get an interview, here are some tips to help you get through it successfully. First, make sure that you dress appropriately. This means, wear dress pants or slacks instead of jeans. Wear a dress shirt instead of a t-shirt. Dress neatly, and dress professionally. Also, be clean and look clean. An employer wants to hire someone professional and neat, so remember that when preparing for your interview. If you are planning on wearing makeup to this interview, make sure it's minimal. Don't overdo it on eyeliner or eye shadow. Make sure your face looks natural. I cannot stress it enough that the first impression someone has of you is your appearance, so make this first impression count.

When arriving at your interview, it is very important to arrive early. This shows the interviewer that you are punctual. Once you are at your interview location, check in and let the interviewer know you are there. At the very beginning of the interview, remember to shake the interviewer's hand. This gives off a professional first impression to whomever is interviewing you.

As for the interview itself, the interviewer will be asking you a series of questions. Some examples of questions that might be asked are: “Why do you want to work here?,” “Why do you think we should hire you over other candidates?” or “What are some traits about yourself that you think we should know about you?” This is your chance to brag about yourself and your qualities. Don't hold back because this is exactly what the interviewer wants to hear. If the interviewer likes you and thinks that you are a good fit for the job, often times, they will hire you on the spot. If they don't hire you on the spot, be sure to follow up on your interview the same way you followed up on your application.

Finally, I will leave you with this. If you don't get hired right away, don't be discouraged and never give up. Continue your search and have fun with it.

# Weekend split leaves tennis team at 2-2

After coming off of a win against Mexico last Wednesday night, the Raider tennis team looked to continue its winning ways on Friday as they faced the Phoenix Firebirds at home. Going into the game, the Raiders were 1-1, while the Firebirds were 0-4.

The Raiders cruised to victory as they won 4-1 over the winless Firebirds. Only one of the sets in the game was close, as leading the way for the boys was Brad Crofoot in first singles as he defeated Billy Stone in two sets 6-0, 6-1. In second singles Carlos Feliciano won 6-1, 6-4 over Kadin May, but in third singles Evan Waugh could not defeat Phoenix's Zack VanGorder as he lost 6-1, 6-2. On the doubles side, there was little competition as all four sets were 6-0. Ben McKay and Jacob Strauss won first singles and Joel Feliciano and Seth Reidy won in second singles to seal the deal.

The Raiders also had a match the next day when they had to take on the rival Oswego Buccaneers for local bragging rights. The Raiders had little success in this match, however, as they went down 6-1.

The team started off strong but struggled the rest of the way. Getting the only win for the Raiders was Ben McKay in first singles as he won 7-6, fell 2-6, then closed out the point with a 7-6 triumph. Brad Crofoot lost in second singles to Alex Kemper 6-2, 6-2 and Jake Strauss could not defeat Jacob Gerber and went down 6-3, 6-2.

Fourth singles was close but Carlos Feliciano could not come away with the win as he lost 6-4 and 6-3. The first doubles team of Thomas Distin and Austin Nairn lost 6-0 and 6-1. It was a pretty close matchup in second singles but Seth Reidy and Joel Feliciano came up short as they lost 6-3 in both sets. Third doubles was a forfeit so the

Buccaneers got the point. With the split the Raiders are now 2-2 on the season.

## NHL playoffs are off and running

Arguably one of the toughest sporting events in all of pro sports, the Stanley Cup Playoffs are underway and there have been big matchups in both conferences. The Montreal Canadians have already made it to the next round of the playoffs by winning a lopsided series four games to none against the Tampa Bay Lightning. Their opponent, in a rematch of a long-standing "original six" rivalry will be the Boston Bruins, who skated past Detroit in five games, winning the last four following a tough 1-0 setback in their opening game.

The San Jose Sharks also looked like they would advance into the second round with ease while skating to a 3-0 lead over Los Angeles, but three straight wins by the Kings have extended their series into a deciding game seven on Wednesday. The Western Conference has featured some interesting matchups as Anaheim staged a last minute rally to beat Dallas 5-4 in overtime on Sunday night to advance to the second round and defending Stanley Cup champion Chicago overcame an 0-2 deficit to beat St. Louis four times in a row, with Minnesota downing Colorado on Monday night to produce a winner take all game seven in Colorado.

In the Eastern Conference Pittsburgh eliminated Columbus last night 4-3, nearly squandering a 4-0 lead before putting away the pesky Blue Jackets, while the New York Rangers own a 3-2 series lead heading into tonight's matchup at Philadelphia. On this day in 1945, a lethal couple became legally wed. Eva and Adolf married on this very day. Evan Braun met Adolf Hitler during her time as assistant to the official photographer for the Fuhrer. She was a loyal wife, and married the tyrannical leader hours before they committed a group suicide in their Berlin bunker. This suicide was carried out when the Russians were closing in on the chancellery.

This was the same day and year that American forces freed the Jewish population of the concentration camp in Dachau. Over five hundred Nazi soldiers were killed defending the awe-inspiring camp of horrors. This liberation only took around an hour. The American soldiers were terrified to find the results of Hitler's purist purge of any kind of person he didn't like.

## Quick, easy and tasty: hot pizza dip

This week's recipe is for a delicious, cheesy spin on a classic Italian favorite. With these simple ingredients you will create Hot Pizza Dip. This has all of the delicious qualities of pizza in a convenient delectable dip form. This recipe has been compiled from allrecipes.com

For this dip you will need:

- \* 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- \* 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- \* 1/2 teaspoon dried parsley
- \* 1/4 teaspoon dried basil
- \* 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- \* 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- \* 1 cup pizza sauce
- \* 2 tablespoons chopped green bell pepper



- \* 2 ounces pepperoni sausage, chopped
- \* 2 tablespoons sliced black olives

In a small mixing bowl combine cream cheese, parsley basil and oregano.

Spread the combination in the bottom of a pie plate (9 inch). Sprinkle 1/2 cup of the mozzarella cheese and 1/2 cup of the Parmesan cheese on the mixture.

Lather the pizza sauce over the entire combination, and sprinkle with left over cheese. Top with pepper, olive slices, pepperoni. Microwave the covered mixture for about 5 minutes.

Serve this dip hot, with French baguette bread. This should be ready in about 15 minutes.



They found mounds of bodies in areas near the crematorium and in railway cars as well as rooms filled with shoes, jewelry and other belongings of those that were brutally murdered.

President Richard Nixon announced that he would release official transcripts of 46 recorded White House conversations. This announcement in 1974 was in response to a Watergate scandal trial subpoena issued in July of the previous year.

Nixon was very reluctant to comply with the subpoena and made that very clear in his speech that day. He also explained that he had executive privilege to edit the tapes in the sake of protecting state secrets. The tapes would be free of anything "irrelevant" to the trial. Nixon later made headlines as the first United States President to resign from office (even if only to avoid impeachment).

In 1986 a baseball record was set. During a game between the Boston Red Sox and Seattle Mariners, Roger Clemens struck out 20 batters.

He was the first pitcher in Major League Baseball to ever do such a thing in a nine inning game. Ten years later, he did the same exact thing and is still the only player in the history of baseball to achieve such a feat.


