New technology will charge phones in seconds

A technology company based in Israel has recently released a preview on YouTube showing off their new prototype which has the ability to charge a smartphone in 30 seconds, compared to the usual hour-long process. The company behind the video, StoreDot, says the new technology was based from Alzheimers research which was being conducted at Tel Aviv University.

“During that research, specific amino acids were isolated and we managed to use those amino acids and peptides to create nanocrystals,” said Doron Myersdorf, founder and CEO of StoreDot. “These have special properties that enable us to use them in various devices, such as a battery.”

According to Myersdorf, the battery not only charges rapidly, it also continues to charge after being unplugged from the outlet. The prototype displayed in the video is the size of a cigarette pack, mak-

ing the main challenge the company faces is figuring out how to decrease the size of the battery so that it is able to fit into a wide range of smartphones. Despite this technological advancement, there is still much work to be done according to the company. They plan to have a commercial-ready product finished within the next two years, and hope to release the product to the public shortly after that.

Colored deviled eggs make a nice Easter treat

Looking for a delicious treat for your Easter get together? Well look no further than this daily appetizer column. Every day this week I will be showing off a new treat that can be created for that special day, or just to get in the spirit!

Today’s recipe is for delicious and colorful deviled eggs. You will need:

These portions make 24 deviled egg halves

- * 12 large eggs
- * 1/4 cup creamy salad dressing (such as Miracle WhipÆ)
- * salt and ground black pepper to taste
- * hot sauce
- * 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- * 4 drops red food coloring, or desired amount



- * 4 drops blue food coloring, or desired amount
- * 4 drops green food coloring, or desired amount
- * 3 cups water, or as desired

Begin by placing the eggs into a big saucepan. Cover them with cold water and bring to a boil

After 3 minutes of boiling, turn off the heat and cover pot. Let the eggs cook for at least 20 minutes then drain.

Cover the eggs with cold water and peel the now cooled eggs. Slice hard-cooked eggs in half lengthwise and remove the yolk.

Mash all yolks in a bowl with salt, pepper, hot sauce, Miracle Whip and dry mustard until smoothed.

Place the various food coloring into separate bowls and add around 1 cup of water to each. Steep 8 egg halves in each of the bowls which will add Easter colors to the whites. If more color is needed, add it!

Then simply add the yolk filling to the colored egg halves, cover and let chill for around 30 minutes before serving and you have this delicious Easter treat!

New discoveries made about missing Malaysian plane

An Australian ship that has been searching for the missing Malaysian Airlines jetliner has picked up pings consistent with the beacons from aircraft black box recorders. On Monday officials were saying that these pings were their strongest lead since the plane went missing over a month ago. A U.S Navy “towed pinger locator” on board Australia’s Ocean Shield picked the pings up over the weekend.

The first ping they picked up for two hours and the second ping was picked up for thirteen minutes. Houston said these signals are the best lead that the investigators have so far, yet efforts to pick up the pings again have been unsuccessful. “If we don’t get any further transmissions, we have a reasonably large search area of the bottom of the ocean to prosecute and that will take a long, long time. It’s very slow, painstaking work,” said Houston.

The black boxes record cockpit data and could possibly give investigators answers about what happened to the plane. The plane

was carrying 227 passengers and 12 crew members when it vanished on March 8 and flew thousands of kilometers off its Kuala Lumpur-to-Beijing route.

Authorities believe that from the evidence they have found and the loss of communications that the plane was taken over by someone familiar with the aircraft. But even with all of this evidence that shows foul play authorities have not ruled out the possibility that the plane suffered mechanical problems.

Analysis of satellite data led investigators to conclude the Boeing 777 came down in an area some 1,680 km (1,040 miles) northwest of Perth, near where possible pings were picked up and the search is now focused.

Hopefully the search parties and investigators will be able to find the Boeing 777 with the new information that they have received.

Huskies rule the pack in NCAA basketball

Underdogs. It's a word that is a perfect fit for the University of Connecticut Huskies as they defeated the Kentucky Wildcats in a close 60-54 game to win the NCAA Tournament. The Huskies were the #7 seed while the Wildcats were the #8 seed, making it the highest combined seeds in a championship game.

The game was played at AT&T Stadium, where the Dallas Cowboys play, and there were over 79,000 people in attendance, making it the biggest NCAA Final of all time. UConn had defeated Villanova, Iowa State, Michigan State and Florida to reach the title game, while Kentucky beat Wichita State, Louisville, Michigan, and Wisconsin. Both of these teams, regardless of their seed numbers, showed they were the best. UConn was led by senior guards Shabazz Napier and Ryan Boatright, and Kentucky was led by five freshmen.

The game started out in UConn's favor as they dominated the first fifteen minutes. They led 30-18, but the Wildcats came storming back and were only down by four at half. With the game 35-31 at halftime, both teams needed to make adjustments to try and bring home the title. After a streaking first half, the second half slowed down and was very close. The Wildcats battled to within one point multiple times but could never take the lead. With two minutes left on the clock, the Huskies led by six and felt confident. Kentucky looked to Andrew Harrison to bring them back, but unlike the three previous games he could not do so this time around.

After having been banned from the tournament last year, this was head coach Kevin Ollie's first NCAA Tournament. Ollie went 6-0 in his first tournament and said, "Somebody told me we were Cinderellas, and I was like, no, we're UConn, This is what we do. We are born for this. We're bred to cut down nets. We're not chasing championships. Championships are chasing us."

This was the same Huskies team that lost 81-48 to Louisville just a month ago. There were two big factors in Monday night's game; free throws and defense. Throughout the whole tournament, the Huskies shot 90% from the charity stripe and finished 10-10 on Monday. Kentucky, on the other hand, struggled at the line and shot 13-24. UConn's defense also led them to the win as they held the Wildcats to 21 points below their normal averaged and forced them to shoot 39% from the field. Shabazz Napier led the Huskies with 22 points, 6 rebounds, and 6 assists, which helped him become the

Final Four's most outstanding player. After the win, the Huskies improved to 4-0 in National Championships Games.

Making NCAA history

The University of Connecticut men's basketball team made history Monday night by becoming the first 7 seed to win the national championship, their second title in the last four years. Senior Shabazz Napier won his second title with the Huskies as he carried the team to the championship this season, Napier averaged 18 points per game and led the team in rebounds as a point guard. Juniors DeAndre Daniels and Ryan Boatright played a big role in the championship run combining for 25 points per game.

Connecticut had an extremely impressive tournament, beating the second, third and fourth seeds in their region and then taking out heavily favored and top seeded Florida team in the final four. Napier became the third player in NCAA history to score 125 points while having 30-plus assists and rebounds while winning the tournament. UConn's Kemba Walker did it in 2011 and Hall of Fame performer Larry Bird was the other. The Huskies played great in the tournament against tough opponents beating 1 seed Florida by 10 and 2 seed Villanova by 12.

Kentucky, a team which started five freshman among seven first-year players on the squad, made a great run as an 8 seed beating previously undefeated Wichita State and then going on to beat defending champions Louisville, 2013 national finalist Michigan and powerhouse Wisconsin in the final four to advance and play Connecticut for the title.

Kentucky started out the game shaky as one would expect an overwhelmed team of freshman to do in front of nearly 80,000 screaming fans. Kentucky did not shoot well from the free throw line in the game as they went just 8-15 in the second half. "I've never coached a team this young," Kentucky Coach John Calipari said Monday night. "Never. I hope I don't ever again."

Napier, who put up 23 against Kentucky, is a huge reason for the win, as any time Kentucky would get close he was there to knock down another big shot. Napier and Boatright's speed proved to be too much for Kentucky's group of freshmen to handle as they won the game 60-54 and denied the Wildcats a second NCAA title in three seasons.
