Girls track runs to second victory

The Raider girls track team charged to its second straight win during an otherwise dismal Wednesday for Fulton forces. Upping their count to 2-0 on the season, the girls bested Mexico 80-57. The boys were not so fortunate in an 84-57 loss to Mexico while the girls lacrosse team dropped an 11-8 decision at East Syracuse-Minoa.

A collection of big performances helped carry the girls track team to victory as Amber DeStevens ruled the hurdles by winning both the 100 and 400 meter events while also taking part in the first place 400 meter relay team along with Erica Pawlewicz, who earned first place points in both the long jump and 200 meter dash. Jessica Race ruled the cement circle with victories in both the discus and shot put and Callie Beckwith claimed the triple jump and was part of the winning 1600 meter relay. Victoria Eckhard topped the field in the 300 meter run to add to the victorious total.

The boys picked up a shot put/discus double from Nick Reitz while Bryce Phillips won the 400 hurdles and 3200 meter run, but it

Earth Day: 45 years old and still going strong

Every year, millions of people all over the country celebrate Earth Day. But where did it come from and when did it start?

The idea for Earth day came to a man named Gaylord Nelson, a senator from Wisconsin, after witnessing the public reaction to the massive oil spill of 1969 in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the anti-war movement of students with a purpose of making environmental protection and preservation an item that should be on the political agenda, Nelson was moved by the passion that others shared in helping to save the world around them.

Senator Nelson then introduced the idea for a "National Teach-in on the environment" to the national media. He then persuaded Republican

Congressmen to help him by being his co-chair and shortly after, recruited David Hayes as a national coordinator. Hayes then put together a staff of about 85 to help promote the movement around the country.

As a result, all over the country on April 22, there were rallies of all kinds which were promoting topics like water clean up, air pollution and so much more that took place in parks, museums, auditoriums, and even in the streets. There were groups who fought against oil spills, toxic dumps, the use of pesticides, power plants, raw sewage, and the extinction of wildlife.

Earth Day of 1970 produced such a large movement that it brought together Republicans and Democrats to work together on the project, along with city slickers and farmers, the rich and the poor, tycoons and labor leaders. Everyone stepped up to help make a change.

was not enough to overcome a Mexico cause led by Hunter Hellinger's victorious showings in the triple, long and high jump as well as a role in the winning 1600 relay.

Bailey Lutz paced the 800 meter run for Fulton and was a member of the winning 3200 meter relay and Gareth Roik topped the pole vault competition as the Raiders fell to 1-1 on the season.

Kate McGarity scored three times as ES-M completed a season sweep over the Raiders. Improving to 4-5 overall and 3-3 in league play the Spartans owned a 20-10 shooting advantage as they nearly duplicated their 11-7 win at Fulton on April 7. Keara Patterson answered with three goals while Jordan Coulon had two goals and two assists to go with two goals from Mckenna Chesbro for the Raiders, who fell to 5-4 overall and 1-4 in the league despite nine saves from Kayla Pafumi.

Today, it has been reported that over 184 countries throughout the world take part in their own Earth Day celebrations with over five thousand environmental support groups. It is estimated that the movement will continue to grow due to the use of the internet and social media, making for an even larger group than the previous year and expanding the awareness of the environmental problems and the actions that need to be taken to improve them.
