

J-D Rams past Raiders on court, diamond

Fulton came away seeing red on Tuesday as the Red Rams of Jamesville-Dewitt made it a miserable day for Raider forces with lopsided wins in tennis, baseball and softball. J-D owned the court in a 7-0 triumph while the baseball Rams outscored the homestanding Raiders 11-7. The softball team finished off a tough afternoon with a trip to J-D that found them on the wrong side of a 16-2 final.

Jamesville-Dewitt's unbeaten tennis team made quick work of the young Raiders, yielding just 10 points along the way while winning every match in straight sets. The second doubles team of Anthony Salerno and Eric Shear put up the strongest fight of the day in a 6-4 first set loss as the Rams cruised to 13-0 on the season at the expense of the 5-8 Raiders.

It was a similar story on the baseball diamond as Fulton fell victim to the big inning in an 11-7 loss to J-D. Five run eruptions in the third and sixth innings helped the visitors erase an early 3-0 deficit and added insurance to a 6-5 advantage in the top of the sixth. The Red Rams pounded out 14 hits on the day with Casey Kretsch going three

for four with four rbi to go with two hits, two runs and two rbi apiece from Xander Ferlanda and Matthew Cappelletti.

Cody Green answered with three hits and drove in a run for the Raiders, who also picked up two hits and an rbi off the bats of Jon Cummins and Koda LaBeef as well as a two run single from Charlie Alton. With the win J-D remained in a virtual tie with 9-0 CBA for the OHSL Freedom title at 10-1, 11-4 overall while dropping the Raiders to 4-7 in the league and 4-10 overall.

The J-D girls completed the sweep on the afternoon by roaring past an early 1-0 deficit to hand the Raiders a 16-2 setback. Five runs in the second inning and seven more in the sixth helped carry the league leading Red Rams to 10-1 in the OHSL Freedom Division and 11-6 overall. Makenzie Keeler and Carly O'Hearn inflicted major damage with three hits and four rbi apiece and Alyssa Robens ripped a home run for the winners. Katelyn Ely and Brynn Waloven had two hits apiece for the Raiders, who fell to 4-11 overall and 2-8 in league play with the loss.

Orders now being taken for Class of 2015 shirts



Why not let us take a stand during class?

As high school students, many of us have a full school day with a schedule jam packed with all different classes of all different levels. All of us have that one class that we may dread to sit through during our school day purely because we are simply tired of sitting and staying still. By the end of the day students are exhausted and just want nothing more than to be done with their classes. After returning home to their family and asked how their day was, wouldn't it be refreshing to know that they will respond with something such as, "it was actually really good, I had fun," or "guess what we did in this class today?" instead of things like "it was so boring, I hate just sitting there" or "I just want it to be over with already." It is up to all of us a whole to make changes that continue to improve our community and the education it provides to the upcoming generation.
