

Orchestra concert closes 2014-15 music season

Tonight at 7:30 p.m. G Ray Bodley's Concert, Symphonic, and Chamber Orchestras will be performing their final concert of the 2014-2015 school year.

The night will begin with the Concert Orchestra performing four pieces which consist of Georgia on my Mind arranged by Bob Cerulli, Run to You by Penatonix, Don't Stop Believing arranged by Bob Phillips, and Eine Kleiine Nachtmusik arranged by Mozart.

What is special about the last concert for the seniors is that they have been given the opportunity to choose a piece for the entire orchestra to play, the catch to doing so however is that they also have to conduct the song chosen. Some of our seniors did this in the March concert to shorten the time length of

the one tonight. Out of the four Concert Orchestra pieces there will be two senior conductors; Lauren Gaido with Don't Stop Believing, and Stephen Heywood with Run to You. After all of the pieces are finished the seniors will proceed to the front of the stage where teacher Anna Edele, with help from a select few of the underclassmen, will distribute roses to the seniors congratulating them on their high school accomplishments and wishing them the best of luck in college.
