

Plenty of options if you're looking for a scare

It's October, and that means Halloween. And as the "scariest day of the year" approaches there are more and more attractions open to get you hyped up and your blood pumping.

These attractions include Demon Acres, Nightmare Farms, Fright Nights at the Fair, Thirteenth Hour Rising Haunted Hayride, and the Trail of Terror.

Demon Acres, located at 341 County Rte. 6 in Hannibal, has a haunted house, hayride, and features the experience of being buried alive. It is open every Friday and Saturday from 7 pm to 11 pm and it is also open on Sunday, October 11th. It costs \$12 for the haunted house, \$10 for the hayride, \$20 for the combo, \$35 for VIP, and \$5 to be buried alive.

Nightmare Farms, which is at 4816 State Rte. 49, has a haunted house, trail, and labyrinth. It is open every Friday and Saturday from 7 pm to 10 pm starting tonight. However it is not open on Halloween. It costs \$13 for your first attraction then \$6 for each additional one.

Fright Nights at the Fair, located in the parking lot of the New York State Fair, has haunted houses and a hayride. It is also open every Friday and Saturday and costs \$10 for one attraction or \$20 for them all.

Thirteenth Hour Rising Haunted Hayride is located at 84 Merritt Road in Fulton, and like the name suggests, has a hayride. It is open every Friday and Saturday from 6:30

pm to 10 pm and it is also open Sunday, October 11th and it is not open on Halloween. It costs \$14 for the hayride.

The Trail of Terror, 475 Clifford Road in Volney, is a long-standing area tradition celebrating its 26th season of scares. The Trail has a haunted house and a trail. It is open every Friday and Saturday from 7 pm to 11 pm and it is also open Sunday, October 11th and 25th and Thursday, October 29th from 7pm to 10 pm. It costs \$10 for the haunted house, \$10 for the trail, \$18 for a combo, and \$30 for a VIP combo.

There are many attractions and they are fun and affordable while being close to home.

According to KidsHealth.org, HFMD can produce sores or blisters on a person's hands, feet, tongue, throat or mouth. HFMD is most common among young children, however it can affect adults as well.

As no documented case has presented itself to the nurse's office yet, School Nurse Mrs. Blount cannot confirm the rumors of HFMD due to school safety policies.

According to Mrs. Blount, "a little bit of everything," has been going around the school, and there are "an unusual amount of

starts out with a fever, sore throat and a reduced appetite. About two days later, painful sores can develop in the back of the throat. These sores and blisters may often appear on the soles of one's feet or hands.

Since HFMD is a virus, there are only treatments for the symptoms, not the virus itself. Mrs. Blount offers a few prevention strategies. Avoid sharing "mouthguards and water bottles," lount stated. This is a common way viruses such as these have been spread. Mrs. Blount also adds that one cannot be too cautious, especially this time of year with the meningitis season approaching.

The Raider boys soccer team ventured into the ranks of Class AA for the second time in three nights on Wednesday, and this time it proved to be a profitable journey with a 3-1 win over West Genesee. With two goals in the opening half Fulton used a quick start to improve to 9-2-1 on the season as Austin Beckwith netted his 11th goal of the season while Spencer Vono notched a goal and an assist.

Fellow senior Austin Wilde continued a strong campaign with a goal and Jared Marden had two assists for the winners, who are currently ranked #14 in New York State following their outstanding start.

“The boys deserve the honor for their hard work and dedication to the sport,” Raider Coach Nate Murray commented. “They have put in a ton of time over the years to get to where they are at.”

Homemade Applesauce

Ingredients:

- 8 medium sized apples
- 1/2 cup of brown sugar
- 1 tbs of vanilla extract
- 2 tbs of water

Steps:

1. Peel, core, and cut apples into small chunks.
2. Place apples into 3 quart saucepan
3. Add water and brown sugar to saucepan and stir until apples are coated
4. Cook and cover apples over medium heat for 15 minutes or until soft enough to mash
5. When soft, mash with a potato masher or a fork
6. Stir in vanilla extract
7. Let cool and enjoy


