

Second season starts tonight

The season will be on the line tonight when the Fulton Red Raiders take on the Comets from Carthage High School in a 7 pm start. Both teams are 3-4 heading into the game, with the winner advancing to next week's semi-final round of the Class A playoffs.

The Raider's defensive ends will have to be sure to close off the outside due to the Comets quick running back Jacob Lillie, who is leading the team in both scoring and rushing yards. Lillie has 449 rushing yards this season and four touchdowns as well. Carthage can also hand the ball to either BK Kelly or quarterback Mike Nevills, as they have combined for over 500 yards.

Fulton will be looking to senior Quinton Jackson and junior Frank Barbagallo, who is beginning to make waves as a major threat with 24 points this season. The Raiders will be looking to avenge a long stand of frustration against the Comets, who knocked them out of the playoffs last season and also prevailed 42-19 in the season opener for both teams.

- 1/2 tbs. cornstarch with 1/2 tbs. of cold water

Steps:

- 1). Preheat oven to 350 degrees

- 2).. Cut up apples into small chunks.
- 3). Over low heat, combine butter, brown sugar, vanilla and water in a medium sized sauce pan
- 4). Mix cornstarch with water until a smooth consistency.
- 5). Once brown sugar mixture is at a smooth consistency, stir in cornstarch.
- 6). Mix apple chunks with brown sugar and cook for 5 or so min-

utes until the apples become somewhat soft. Then remove from heat.

7). Unroll one pie crust and divide crust into thirds.

8). Place crusts on cookie sheet lined with foil.

9). Spoon out small amount of apples with sauce onto one side of

crust. Fold the other side of crust over the apples and pinch the sides with a fork.

- 10). Bake in oven for 15-20 minutes until lightly brown

Voting underway for Charlotte Awards

A vote is occurring at G. Ray Bodley High School and over all of New York state, but it has nothing to do with politics!

The Charlotte Award, named after E. B. White's classic book *Charlotte's Web*, serves the purpose of encouraging a wide range of students to read remarkable and notable literature in hopes of inspiring life-long readers.

Raiders seek end to Comet dominance

According to Fulton Coach Jeff Rothrock, there are both advantages and disadvantages associated with playing such a familiar opponent. “(The) advantage is we can look at what we did wrong the first time and try and correct that,” he commented. “Disadvantage is the mental aspect of knowing you are playing a team you lost to. But you’d be surprised how teams change what they are doing over the course of a season. Players change, schemes change and tendencies change.”

One thing the Raider boss is hoping to see change is his team’s habit of being overly generous against Carthage, a trait that has seen the Jefferson County squad best Fulton six times in a row. “The last three times we have faced Carthage I have entered the games feeling confident. In all three instances, we shot ourselves in the foot countless ways,” he stated. “I would just like to play them without handing them touchdowns and field position. We need to play mistake free football to win. Their quarterback and tailback are very good runners. We have had three weeks of facing good backs, so we should be used to it.”

Nevills, the Carthage quarterback, has made good on 40 of his 70 attempts including nine apiece to Daniel Slade and Dylan Highers. Caleb Null has only accounted for 110 rushing yards this season, but four of his attempts have finished in the opposing end zone. The Comets are coming off a 51-20 beatdown at the hands of East Syracuse-Minoa and have lost three of their last four games with the lone victory a 10-7 struggle past Watertown, a team the Raiders eased past last week. If recent performances are any indication, Carthage may just be ripe for the picking tonight, but only if the Raiders bring their “A” game.

“I like our chances when we play well,” Rothrock stated. “Unfortunately the coaches don’t play the game. It’s up to the kids. Our players have worked hard and have done all that we have asked. I would like them to reap the reward of their hard work, but as in life things don’t always work that way. I’m hoping Friday night gives them the chance to give Carthage the type of game the coaches know they are capable of.”

Second half goal ends playoff hopes

Close, but still so far away. Such was the case for the Fulton girls soccer team on Thursday evening when the second round again proved to be their undoing in a hard fought 1-0 loss to New Hartford. Sophomore goaltender Maddie Lang stood tall with 15 saves on the night, but she was unable to keep the high scoring Spartans at bay for the entire contest as New Hartford improved to 16-1-1 on the season by the slimmest of margins.

New Hartford’s deadly scoring duo of Micaela Honsinger and Jordan Restivo combined on the only goal of the game in the second half as Honsinger notched her 24th marker of the season to help the Spartans advance into the third round of the Class A tournament. Abby Bucholz registered six saves as New Hartford held Fulton off the scoreboard for the first time this season to end a strong Raider campaign at 11-6-1.

Raiders face streaking side in second round

After a record setting offensive explosion on Wednesday night, things will likely be much tougher this evening for the Fulton boys soccer team. The third seeded Red Raiders face a familiar foe in #6 seed East Syracuse-Minoa, and despite the fact that Fulton has already beaten them once this season, the team that Fulton topped 1-0 in September is a far cry from the ES-M side that will come to town at 5:30 tonight.

Losers of their first five games this season, the Spartans have righted their ship and are 8-3-1 in their last 11 starts including a 5-1-1 mark in the last seven. On Tuesday night they overcame an early 1-0 deficit to best Oswego 4-1, so momentum could well be a factor for the boys in orange and blue.

David Neff scored his sixth and seventh goals of the season to lead the way while Brad Hartung tops the ES-M scoring ledger with 13 goals and three assists. Other danger men on the Spartan side are fivegoal contributor Kyle Scalzo and the team’s assist leader Abdullah Mujcic, who has three goals and four helpers so far this season.

There will be a lot at stake tonight for both teams as the winner advances into the third round of the Class A tournament, where they will face either #10 seeded Vernon-Verona-Sherrill or #2 seed Jamesville-Dewitt.

Scientifically speaking


Avogadro's got our number for Mole Day

You may not realize it, but today, October 23rd, is a very important day for scientists—especially chemists. It is a holiday celebrating one of chemistry's most crucial concepts. Today is Mole Day.

A mole is 6.02×10^{23} particles. The placement of the holiday comes from the number itself. October 23rd is 10-13, and the holiday only lasts from 6:02 a.m. to 6:02 p.m. to represent the 6.02. The number itself is known as Avogadro's number, and is significant because it acts as a conversion factor between grams and atomic mass units. This helps scientists create a specific ratio of two elements or compounds.

If a chemist wanted to combine two elements with a ratio of exactly 1:2, he couldn't



just measure out 1 gram of one and 2 grams of the other, because there will be different numbers of atoms since the elements have different masses. The chemist could say he wanted 1 mole (6.02×10^{23} particles) of one and 2 moles of the other, and then multiply the number of moles wanted by the atomic mass of each element needed to achieve the right mass of that element. This works because 6.02×10^{23} is the number of particles in a mole and the number of atomic mass units in a gram.

To make a long explanation much simpler, Avogadro's number is very important. Therefore, we celebrate Mole Day to honor Avogadro's number by solving chemistry problems and making bad puns. Why was Avogadro afraid to go to Mexico? He had heard they made guaca-mol-e out of fresh Avogadros!

In honor of Mole Day, some tips to survive Chemistry

In honor of Mole Day today I'll be teaching you how to surpass one of the toughest obstacles to high school survival—your chemistry class.

Chemistry is a tough course, and some find it one of the most difficult obstacles to surviving the high school challenge. Many students have trouble understanding the material or solving questions, which can both be very tricky. Unfortunately for many, chemistry is typically the third and final science course required for graduation. This means that most students must find some way to overcome this challenge, but it can be done with the right strategy.

Chemistry is often overwhelming. There is a lot to the course, and all of it builds on the previous material, which means that understanding is crucial. Chemistry cannot be skated through. Whenever you take notes on a topic (which will be often), make sure you understand it. None of the work is too difficult or complicated provided you get the concepts.

There are a few ways to ensure your comprehension of the material. The simplest is to go over the notes...then, go over them again, and again, and again. This method sometimes works, but straight memorization is not recommended by most chemistry

teachers. A better strategy is to make sure you know how to use the material and solve related problems.

This requires practice problems and lots of them. They can be very difficult, but they are all doable. The only way to improve at these is to do them, ask your teacher any questions you have on them, and keep doing them until they make sense.

Another reason understanding is so important is that tests in Chemistry can be heavily weighted, to account for a large part of your average.

If you know the material, you will do well on the tests, although they are difficult. Using these strategies, you will be able to pass the class. You will be able to survive chemistry.
