Raiders pitch a shutout in big win over Spartans

All systems were go for the Raider baseball team on Monday when the boys in red roared past East Syracuse-Minoa by a 7-0 count. Riding the strong arm of pitcher Bryce Guernsey and an offense that picked up two hit showings from five different players, Fulton improved to 8-6 on the season at the expense of the 9-4 Spartans.

Guernsey turned in an impressive performance on the hill as he went the distance and struck out 13 in a complete game six-hit shutout. On the other side of the plate the Raiders scored four times in the second inning and never looked back while putting together a 12 hit attack paced by two hits and two RBI from Adam Baldwin.

Cody Green added a single and double with an RBI and Cole Cotton slapped two hits with an RBI while Cameron Clark stroked a double and a single and Koda LaBeef had two hits.

Fulton will look to make it three wins in a row this afternoon when the Raiders host Chittenango in a 4:30 pm start.

Well staged Mock DWI was a real eye opener

With the help of the community, G. Ray Bodley High School juniors and seniors were able to watch and hopefully comprehend the intensity and seriousness of a DWI.

The mock DWI, which was staged at the high school on Friday, May 6, included students from our own school, helping to make the scene even more real for all those watching. This was my first mock DWI and I can say I was nowhere even remotely prepared for what I saw.

The scene began with the 911 call to report the head on crash between two cars, both filled with GRB students after the dance. Once the scene was unveiled you could see that many students were seriously injured. There was a student flown through a window and some were unconscious in the car. Due to the seriousness of some of the student's injuries an actual helicopter was flown in.

Only one student was taken in the helicopter, this being the one who had flown through the front window and lost part of his arm due to the crash. Another student reportedly died on the scene, and the crowd was silent as a white sheet was placed over his body.



The rest of the students were taken in ambulances to be further treated. However the only remaining driver, the other was the student who had died, was taken into custody after failing his sobriety test at the scene of the crash. After everyone had cleared the scene the students of GRB went inside to the auditorium to finish the mock DWI. This included informing the parent of the death of her

son, the courtroom convicting the drunk driver, and the funeral. During this portion of the mock DWI there were speakers interjecting between scenes to help further show how real this issue is. I personally found myself trying not to cry at moments and was overwhelmed with the overall emotion of the students and faculty.

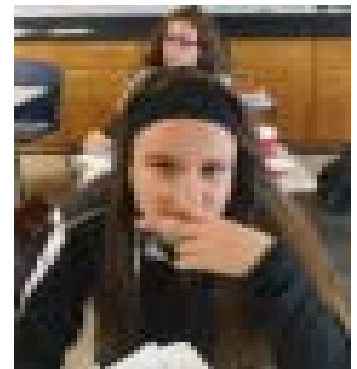
