



## Baseball, girls lax advance in playoff openers

### Quick start carries baseball past Bears for eighth straight win

It was an afternoon to cherish for the Red Raider baseball team and one to forget for the Lady Raider softball squad as the two sides opened the Section III Tournament in

dramatically opposite fashion on Tuesday. For the boys an 8-6 victory over Chittenango extended their winning streak to eight in a row while propelling Fulton into the second

round of the playoffs for the first time in over a decade. The girls found themselves on the wrong side of a 21-4 trip to East Syracuse-Minoa as the Spartans completed a lopsided sweep over the Lady Raiders.

### Lady Raiders rout Whitesboro, now 16-1

Lacrosse's second season started the same way the first one ended for the Lady Raiders on Thursday when Fulton roared past Whitesboro 18-6 in the opening round of the Class B playoffs. Extending the most successful season in school history to 16-1, the #2 seeded girls booked their place in the second round where they will meet #3 Jamesville-Dewitt on Thursday evening at Christian Brothers Academy with a berth in the Section III final on the line. The Rams advanced by virtue of an 11-5 win over Auburn while Carthage ripped Central Square 15-5 and defending champion Watertown overwhelmed Oswego 20-4.

Section III goal scoring leader Haley Carroll torched the Warriors for eight goals and two assists and McKenna Chesbro ripped the twines for five goals and three assists as Fulton ran out to a 7-2 halftime lead and never looked back. Keara Patterson joined Carroll in the 100 point club with two goals and three assists while Jordan Coulon and Mallori Kitts added two goals and an assist apiece. Taylor Kesterke also scored for the Raiders, who peppered Whitesboro goaltender Elizabeth Militello with 33 shots en route to their runaway win that also featured 11 goals after the intermission.

Carroll burst to within a marker of the 80 goal plateau and now has 107 points on the season (79-28-107) and Patterson surpassed 100 points with 44 goals and 59 helpers. Chesbro now has 57 goals and 25 assists for 82 points as the three have combined for 180 goals and 97 assists on a Raider side that has tormented opposing goaltenders to the tune of a single season record 274 goals and counting and 435 points overall.

#### J-D thwarts Raider boys

Jamesville-Dewitt lived up to its number one billing and then some on Tuesday as the Red Rams blitzed past the Raider boys 22-2 in the second round of the Section III Tournament. The seven-time defending Section III champion and state ranked Rams improved to 15-2 on the season by opening up an 8-1 lead in the first quarter that extended to 15-1 at the half.

Ryan Archer led the way with four goals and two assists and Griffin Cook had three goals and three assists as twelve different players scored for J-D, David Tallents and Spencer Vono closed out impressive careers for the Red Raiders with solo markers and Austin Beckwith added an assist as Fulton's season came to an end at 8-10. The Rams will continue their quest for an eighth straight title on Thursday when they meet #4 seeded New Hartford, a 13-11 winner over East Syracuse-Minoa, in a game to be played at Central Square. All four top seeds advanced as #3 Carthage topped Watertown 16-7 and #2 Auburn bested Central Square 14-6.

Fulton's first playoff appearance in recent memory got off to a resounding start as the Raiders scored three times in each of their first two trips of the plate to build a 6-0 lead. But unlike their most recent game against the Bears, a 12-1 rout, Chittenango had plenty of fight with a four run fourth inning, and it was game on.

The Raiders quickly added a pair of insurance runs and then held off the comeback minded Bears, limiting them to solo tallies in both the fifth and sixth innings before putting the game away with a scoreless seventh.

Winning pitcher Bryce Guernsey continued a string of strong performances on the Red Raider hill by fanning seven batters before Nolan Bonnie tossed three innings of one-hit ball to earn the save. On the other side of the plate Fulton roughed up Chittenango starter Wyatt Myers for 10 hits and all eight runs in 3.2 innings as part of an overall 11 hit attack.

Cole Cotton hammered two doubles and a single and scored three times for the Raiders while Cody Green made it on base four times the hard way with a single, double and two pitches to the body. For his efforts the Fulton senior scored twice and drove in a run while Adam Baldwin ripped two hits to bring home two Raiders and Will Caster had two hits and an rbi.

Cameron Clark rounded out the scoring with an rbi single and crossed the plate twice for the winners. Chittenango standout Zane Cowburn ended his high school career with three hits for the Bears.

Upping their count to 14-6 on the season, Coach Kip Harvey's crew will now face local rival Oswego on Thursday as the #6 seeded Bucs slipped past Oneida 4-3. In other opening round action Jamesville-

## California program pays kids not to kill

In the fall of 2007 the city agency Office of Neighborhood Safety, or ONS, was founded after the spread of gun violence began to spiral rapidly out of control in Richmond, California. This agency takes reformed criminals-turned city workers and uses them as mentors for teenage boys suspected of doing multiple violent crimes. These boys are not in jail only because the police do not have sufficient evidence to convict them, but are often the main suspects of many crimes. This program allows these boys an opportunity to turn a new leaf and make a good life for themselves.

In 2007 there were 47 gun homicides in Richmond, and in 2014 there were only 11 gun-related homicides. DeVone Boggan helped to found this agency and believes that the decrease in these homicides is partly because of this agency. The agency chooses not to just focus in on certain areas, but more specifically focuses on certain people. "We learned that focusing on hot spots [is] important, but they're not more important than hot people. Why? Because hot people make hot spots," Boggan says.

He believes that this agency can help these boys learn not only the difference between right and wrong, but to also learn that they have other opportunities out there and can do things for themselves. The agency helps the boys get their driver's license and sets up help

for job interviews and internships. After six months of truly good behavior the fellows can even begin to earn a stipend of \$1,000 a month.

Boggan honestly wants to help the boys set up a new life for themselves and to help start on a good path, saying "They're babies growing up in a war zone." With his help and the assistance of all those associated with the agency, hopefully the decline will continue, and violence within the area will cease to be so out of control.

## Looking for college cash? Try these online sites

There are still chances to win scholarships before college starts up in the fall. Even though most scholarships in the guidance office have passed their deadline there are other ways to apply for scholarships. Scholarship search engines are very helpful, and the five main engines are collegeboard.com, collegenet.com, fastweb.com, scholarships.com, and scholarshipmonkey.com.

College Board was founded in 1900 and currently helps 7 million students annually prepare for higher education. The College Board began publishing their book of scholarships in 1997 and since then has made the information available online. Their scholarship database contains more than 2,300 scholarship opportunities, totaling nearly \$3 billion.

Staff perform a mass update of all scholarships annually; changes, corrections, additions, and deletions are also made monthly. College Board's database and printed handbook are broadly relevant and because of The College Board's role as the organization behind the SAT, AP exams, etc., they have high standards for the scholarships they include in their database, including only those scholarships with a documented history from a well-established sponsor. lege Board only uses your information to help you and to improve its services. They do not rent or sell your information.

CollegeNET is a technology company that builds web-based tools for event and academic scheduling, prospect and admissions management, tuition processing, and alumni development for colleges and universities. CollegeNET also operates a scholarship search engine and social network where students create topics, participate in discussions, and vote on scholarship winners.

CollegeNET.com updates its data monthly through its license agreement. CollegeNET.com's privacy policy states, "We do not rent or sell personal information to third parties." However, if you are awarded a scholarship, you can opt in to their Scholarship Election System and share your data with the school that you designate. CollegeNET.com hosts an online community that invites students to create topics in an open forum, share their comments, and vote

online to determine who is leading the most interesting conversation.

By the end of the voting cycle every Wednesday, the student with the most votes wins between \$3,000-\$5,000 in scholarship money. This social networking scholarship is open to all students and is not based on traditional factors like GPA, age, or income level; you are not required to write essays, and the scholarship process is voted upon by your peers, rather than a panel of judges.

Fastweb, which has helped 50 million students find money since the site was founded 15 years ago, was the first online scholarship matching service and the first free national scholarship matching service. Fastweb's site indicates they currently have roughly 1.5 million scholarships worth \$3.4 billion in their database. They update their database daily. Fastweb expires scholarships from their database after 11 months, forcing them to update the information before it can be relisted. Fastweb compiles their scholarship data in-house, and when new scholarships are added they send an E-mail notification to every student who matches the award.

Founded in 1999, Scholarships.com now claims to be the largest free and independent scholarship search and financial aid information resource on the Internet, with more than 2.7 million scholarships worth a total of \$19 billion in their database. Vice President Kevin Ladd says their database is updated daily. "We encourage scholarship providers to not only submit their scholarship to be included in our database, but also to update them." They also have a staff to review new and edited listings, and "every few months or so" they review all scholarships for changes, errors, or inconsistencies.

ScholarshipMonkey.com claims their database provides students access to more than 1 million undergraduate, graduate, and professional scholarship awards worth in excess of \$3 billion from greater than 4,000 sources. Like the other search engines, they are committed to providing their service free of charge. ScholarshipMonkey.com states that "the scholarship database is continuously updated by the company's Scholarship Team to ensure you are receiving the most relevant and useful information." Unlike the other search engine sites, ScholarshipMonkey.com does not provide specific timing for their updates. You will receive messages from third parties unless you opt out from receiving information via e-mail or mail. Your scholarship search will be led by a talking monkey on the site.

The sooner you apply, the better chances you have of winning money for college.

### Lady Raiders fall hard

There was no such joy for the Lady Raider softball team as their playoff journey came to an abrupt end at East Syracuse-Minoa in a 21-4 final. The Spartans stormed to victory by scoring in every inning as they transformed a 1-0 advantage into a 19-0 runaway before the Raiders finally answered in the fifth frame.

Six fielding errors and nine walks added to the nightmare finish for the Raiders, who gave up five runs in both the second and third innings and an eight run fourth to end the season at 8-10.

Kyleigh Ashline provided one of the few bright spots for the Raiders with four hits and an rbi and Brynn Waloven delivered a home run to go with two rbi from Aryelle Barbagallo. There were plenty of offensive heroes on the Spartan side as ES-M pounded out 19 hits including a double and two singles for three rbi from Aricia Williams, two triples and two rbi by Taylor Cassella and a double and single for two rbi from Julia Jackson.
