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A spring to remember for Red Raider forces

There is much to be said about this year's Raider sports teams, but no season was as monumental as spring, from the lacrosse teams doing better than most years to baseball making it to the sectional finals for the first time since the 1972 team was at the plate. This year's teams will long be remembered for what they have done, and whether it ended up in the record books or in the hearts and minds of people within the community, Raider hearts beat forever.

The 2016 baseball team accomplished something that no other Fulton baseball team had done since 1972, make the sectional final game. Although the team could not bring home the title the community is still proud of their accomplishments and with a 16-7 record there is nothing to hang their heads about. Winners of 10 straight, a streak so long that no one can remember a better run of baseball domination, the 16 wins were more than the previous four seasons combined.

Cody Green led the way with an impressive .412 batting average with 19 runs batted in, second only to Cole Cotton's team leading 20 rbi around a .359 average at the plate. Koda LaBeef plated 14 runs and hit .305 while Adam Baldwin drove in 13 runs and hit .312 with Cameron Clark (.325) and Nolan Bonnie (.258) bringing home 11 runs apiece on a team that exploded on offense while scoring more than twice as many runs (159) in 2016 as the 2015 edition (69) and also hit .300 as a team. While the Section 3 final represented the end of the line for a

number of senior batsmen, the team will return its top three pitchers in Bryce Guernsey (5-3, 1.23 era), Will Caster (4-1, 3.07 era) and Nolan Bonnie Bonnie (4-0, 2.83 era) as well as a new found winning attitude when play begins in 2017.

The Lady Raider lacrosse team is among the most dominant Raider sports teams.

With only one loss in the regular season the girls finished 16-2 with the second loss coming as a fluke to Jamesville-Dewitt in the sectional quarter final. The team is only losing six seniors, their whole starting defense, but their high powered offense is still intact for the most part for at least the next two years, and with quality players filling in for the graduating seniors next season is looking bright. Sophomore Hailey Carroll tormented opposing defenses while scoring a section leading 82 goals with 29 assists, good for 111 points, while freshman Keara Patterson charged to within two points of the all-time Raider scoring record with 45 goals and 59 assists for 104 points, giving her 209 in the past three seasons. McKenna Chesbro

scored 58 goals with 26 assists for 84 points with Mallori Kitts 33-28-61 and Jordan Coulon 44-12-56 closing out the talented group of underclassmen who helped the Raiders to the best record in school history.

The Raider boys lacrosse team has long been a doormat in Section III, but with this years group of seniors they were able to win their first sectional game in over 10 years! With their second win against Whitesboro this season the Raiders advanced to the second round of sectionals where they faced a state ranked Jamesville-Dewitt team and were unable to prevail. With the help of first team all league recipients Austin Beckwith, and Tyler Shaw the Raiders have something to be proud of. They have given future Raiders a team to look up to, something lacrosse players in the community have not had in a long time.

Fulton track and field has always put out one or more outstanding individuals year after year, and while the team's record was a mere 1-7 the Raiders had individuals who

The museum located in Mumfords, NY, is a historic 19th century living museum covering more than 600 acres. Initial reaction to Overwatch has been strong

Besides being advertised as a first person multiplayer shooting game, Overwatch has been hitting new heights while being critically acclaimed as well as popular among the masses. A week from its launch on May 24th, Blizzard reported over 7 million Overwatch players with a total accumulated playtime of 119 million hours.

It is being labeled a “friendly shooter game,” along the likes of Splatoon and Titanfall for having room for casual and new players alike to be able to fairly compete with each other among the various worlds, alongside with customizable control settings for easier play, and a storyline that attracts people who would not put down \$40-60 for every first person shooter game; Overwatch maintains an extensive fanbase! Going from being in Beta last year to full fledged release last month, the fan base grew overtime from extensive media coverage, from animated shorts to free comics online on their own website.

In all, there were six digital comics, an animated short series which totaled four episodes and a cinematic trailer which showcased at many theatres prior to release alongside an upcoming graphic novel called Overwatch: First Strike to provide for lots of story lore of the world of Overwatch. These focused on the story of several in-game characters including Soldier: 76, the former poster boy of the organization Overwatch, Torbjörn, one of the greatest engineers in game, Reaper, former operative of Blackwatch which was a branch in Overwatch, and Reinhardt, a old mecha suited hero who served in the first Omnic war, Overwatch: First Strike is hoping to provide insight to the first Omnic war of



robots vs. humanity.

In the game players do not follow much of the storyline, as it is generally just a shooting game of matches to cover a point or escort cargo or other missions all in various scenes and world maps that includes an arcade to a movie set to even an old fashioned diner. That is the charm of Overwatch though, it can have fans who simply play the game or it can have fans that only follow the storyline. It is rich in content for both types of fans, with 21 playable characters in all that are divided into 4 classes of Offense, for scouting or pressing the objective, Defense, for guarding locations or establishing a front, Tank, characters that have high levels of health and can lead a charge, and Support, characters known for creating buffs for others or themselves and are known for their healing powers but not so much their attack, all of which is for strategic planning(or not).

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Fans are provided with a wide range of selection that isn't too big but provides enough variety for them to choose their own respectable characters. A cool part of the game is that even when you start the match, players can go back and change their characters to better counter the enemy team of heroes to hopefully win the objective at hand with better chances than before.

Overwatch proves to have a high rating of success with the game and it definitely shows why with the amount of care that went into both story and aspects of the game itself.


