



Raiders fare well at NYS Bowling championship

The OnCenter in Syracuse was packed full of anticipation this past weekend as high school bowlers from around the state gathered for states. Among the crowd was the Fulton Boys Varsity Bowling Team, senior Megan Guernsey, and eighth-grader Alexis Ingersoll.

After an exciting practice on Friday, which was used to get used to the brand new lanes the boys were ready to go. On Sunday March 12 the bowling started. Among the eleven schools in Division 1, each of them winning their own individual section, the Fulton boys ended in fourth.

The first game was a struggle, being the lowest game the Fulton boys bowled in the tournament. After that, it was an attempt to get out of the hole dug. They kept digging away at the gold, and by the end were in fourth place, only behind third by 46 pins.

Jason Southworth had a strong run with a high game of 277, the highest of the tournament. Southworth also finished 4fourth overall, with a 1,224 six game total.

Also for the boys were Aiden Franco, finishing 17th with 1,055. Next were Bradley Martin (1,040) and Joey Benavidez (1,038) finishing 20th and 21st, respectively. Rounding out the team was Anthony Demasi whose six game total was 1,010, right behind the duo, getting him 22nd.

Megan Guernsey and Alexis Ingersoll bowled the day before the boys, representing section III. The two girls bowled on a composite team, made of the top bowlers in the section. Guernsey qualified through league average, and Alexis through a section-wide tournament.

The section III composite team made a great run at the gold, coming in second at the end of the day only down 100 pins. Guernsey finished with the high six game

series for the girls (1,148) and Alexis finished 23rd with a total of (1,029).
