## Record numbers bring discussion to roundtable

On Monday, April 2 students gathered at Principal's Roundtable over recent concerns that have sprung up. This meeting drew several students into the meeting, breaking record numbers of attendance.

On the agenda was GRB News, with the proposed 8-bell schedule next year, and our school culture.

The meeting went for an impressive hour and a half, starting with the discussion of GRB News.

For those who do not know, GRB News has been around for approximately five years and is a staple on no move Fridays during guided study hall. In the past year, the newscast has been working closely with P.B.I.S. to determine what gets put on the webcast. Lately, the future of the newscast has been up in the air, as the cast is currently on a hiatus.

Principal Mrs. Parkhurst went over the original purpose of the newscast, which is to communicate local news, build school community and to set the building up for career and college readiness. She discussed the need to pull ideas from the student body, along with creating a poll to help guide the future of GRB News.

Some suggestions thrown out by students were bringing old segments back (such as "Simply Science"), using the monitors in the halls to display and interact with the cast, and creating daily live announcements to watch in the morning.

Next on the agenda was the proposed

eight-bell schedule for next year. The schedule takes lunch out of normal scheduling, along with reducing it to twenty minutes rather than 40. This would allow the other eight bells to go from 39 to 43 minutes, increasing institutional time.

Although there were many concerns about the schedule, the bell being removed from the schedule was the most mentioned. With the growing amount of opportunities becoming available throughout the school, such as New Visions, Pell Grant, CiTi, and online classes, many students were upset that a bell was planning on being removed. With the bell being removed, it may influence kids to pick between elective classes and programs when they would like to do both.

Another concern was that the shortened lunch would not give students the time to properly socialize, and create connections with teachers and friends. Also, if students

are planning on having a full schedule, there may not be time to decompress and take a break.

Both of these topics tied together to finalize Monday's discussion, by focusing on school culture. Students voiced opinions on how they feel like not only are the students as a whole not on the same page when it comes to topics, but also the students and the administrators.

Several students wanted to improve the feeling of uneasiness in the school, and recent events were talked about, involving highlights in music, sports, and the arts. There were a number of ideas thrown out to increase student participation in these events.

If you have any ideas you believe could take place at GRB, or just want to chat with our administrators then be on the look out for the next Principal's Roundtable date in May.

## Villanova cuts down the nets for a third time

Earlier this week, Villanova immortalized this season by winning the NCAA national championship game. Monday night was not only the crowning of a champion, it symbolizes the ascension of this program. Alumni from all over and from all ages came to support the Wildcats on their win including 1985 champion Ed Pinckney, all-star point guard Kyle Lowry who played at Villanova from 2004-2006, and 2016 champion current Los Angeles Laker Josh Hart. The gathering of these illustrious alumni made the night that much more special.

Coming into Monday's matchup, Villanova was favored over Michigan by an average of 10 points. Michigan did not let this stop them from coming out to an impressive start. The first few minutes of the game made it look like it could go either way. Michigan's stars junior Forward Moritz Wagner, sophomore Forward Charles Matthews, and senior Shooting Guard Muhammad Ali Abdur-Rahkman got Michigan to a strong start on both ends of the court, leading Villanova for most of the first half.

Villanova was just too solid and too balanced of a team to be beaten by three players, though. First, it was junior Guard Jalen Brunson making key steals and setting up teammates to chip away at the surging Michigan team. Then, off the bench, Sophomore Guard Donte DiVincenzo entered the game. DiVincenzo ended the first

half with 18 points and helped Villanova to a 9 point edge at the end of the half. Entering the second half Michigan held DiVincenzo to 0 additional points for nearly 10 minutes, but could not gain an edge still falling into a double-digit deficit. Then the Sophomore Guard started pouring it in again. His sec-

ond-half performance almost single-handedly puts Michigan away. DiVincenzo ended with a game-high 31 points making 10 of his 15 shots and hitting 5 of his 7 shots from three.

The final score was 79-62 Villanova, making them the 2018 NCAA Basketball champions. This is Villanova's second title in the last three years and the college's third championship overall.

Head Coach Jay Wright talked about the anticipation he felt before the game saying, "it's a constant struggle, don't screw this up and then don't be afraid to fail. It's a struggle in your mind up until three minutes to go in the game tonight (against Michigan)."

## Boys rally, girls roll in early season lacrosse

Close calls and a runaway marked the opening week of action for the Fulton lacrosse teams as the boys rallied for a 12-11 win over Rome Free Academy while the girls battled to a split in their opening two games. West Genesee outlasted the Lady Raiders 9-8 before Fulton blasted Cortland 16-2 to even their record at 1-1.

A 5-1 fourth quarter helped the Raider boys storm from behind in their season opening win against the Black Knights. Sam Cary led the way with four goals and two assists and Evan Kistner added three goals and an assist for a Fulton side that also picked up two goals and an assist from Matt Borrow and two goals off the stick of Josh Compson.

The Lady Raiders first trip to the turf produced a hard-fought battle against West Genesee that the Wildcats survived by the

closest of margins. The 'Cats built a 5-4 first half lead and held on for the win as each side scored four times in the second half. Keara Patterson led the way for Fulton with four goals and two assists and Jordan Coulon scored three times against a Wildcat cause that was paced by four goals and an assist from Phoebe Nelson.

The girls came back with a vengeance in their second game with a 12-0 first half barrage that buried the Purple Tigers. Hailey Carroll paced the runaway attack with seven goals and two assists while Emma Weaver scored four goals and McKenna Chesbro added three goals and two assists toward Fulton's 16-2 triumph.

## Tough loss for Raider tennis

On Monday April 2, the Varsity boy's tennis team had their first match of the season at home against Jamesville Dewitt, falling 4-3 to the perennial powerhouse Red Rams.

Anthony Salerno won first singles 7-5, 6-4 while Ryan Lalik claimed a 7-5, 6-3 win
